

**ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
MAY 20, 2019**

The Annual Town Meeting was opened immediately following the Special Town Meeting at 6:36 pm by the Moderator Lucia Casey.

Article 1: To choose all Town Officers as required by law, to be chosen by ballot.

Motion: This article has been taken care of in the election of April 8, 2019. No further action was required.

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote the following consent calendar of routine Annual Town Meeting Articles:

- A. To hear the report of the Town Officers and act thereon;
- B. To authorize the Collector to use the same means which a Treasurer may use when acting as Collector;
- C. To hear and act on the report of any Committee and choose any Committee the Town may think proper;
- D. To authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept and enter into contracts for the expenditure of any funds allocated or to be allocated by the Commonwealth and/or the County for the construction, reconstruction and improvement of Town roads, pursuant to the terms of said funding.

Motion: A motion was made by Selectman Moniz and seconded by Selectman Berube that the Town Adopt Article 2, as written. No discussion.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to establish expenditure limits for revolving funds for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020, under the provisions of Massachusetts General Law chapter 44, §53E½ as shown herein, or take any action relative thereto:

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$8,500,743.00 for the purposes of this article and that said sum be raised from taxation.

Motion: A motion was made by Somerset/Berkley Regional School Committee member Julie Ramos-Gagliardi and seconded by Mike McDonald that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$8,500,743.00 for the purpose of paying the Town's share of operating expenses having been assessed to the Treasurer of the Town of Somerset and that said sum be raised from taxation. The total assessment consisting of two parts: an operating assessment of \$6,899,146.00 and capital expenses \$1,601,597.00. Discussion followed by Mrs. Gagliardi, Ronald Deston, Gerald Waksler, and Anthony Kucikas.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money for the purpose of paying the Town's share of the operating expenses of the **Greater Fall River Vocational Technical High School District** as provided for by section 6 of chapter 697 of the Acts of 1962, said amount having been assessed to the Treasurer of the Town of Somerset, or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,102,288.00 for the purpose of this article and that said sum be raised from taxation.

Motion: A motion was made by Selectman McNamara and seconded by Selectman Berube that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,102,288.00 for the purpose of this article and that said sum be raised from taxation (120 students). Discussion followed by Selectman McNamara.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money for the purpose of paying the Town's share of the operating expenses of the **Bristol County Agricultural School** as provided for by section 82 of chapter 6 of the Acts of 1991, said amount having been assessed to the Treasurer of the Town of Somerset, or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$48,657.00 for the purpose of this article and that said sum be raised from taxation.

Motion: A motion was made by Selectman McNamara and seconded by Selectman Berube that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$48,657.00 for the purpose of this article and that said sum be raised from taxation.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money for the expense of **collecting and disposing of mixed solid waste, recyclables, yard waste, and white goods** and to determine whether pursuant to M.G.L. chapter 44, section 53E, the appropriation for said expense will be offset, in part or in the aggregate, by the estimated receipts from the fees charges for rubbish bags pursuant to Article 10 of the February 8, 1993, Special Town Meeting, as well as funds raised by taxation or transferred from available funds in the Treasury, or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,700,000.00 for the purposes of this article and that the sum of \$850,000.00 be raised from "offset receipts" and that the sum of \$850,000.00 be raised from taxation.

Motion: A motion was made by Selectman McNamara and seconded by Selectman Berube that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,700,000.00 for the purpose of this article and as funding therefore that the sum of \$850,000.00 be raised from "offset receipts" pursuant to MGL Chapter 44, section 53E, and that the sum of \$850,000.00 be raised from taxation. Discussion followed by Selectman McNamara.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to accept Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 59, Section 5C1/2, which provides for an additional real estate exemption for taxpayers who are granted personal exemptions on their domiciles under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 59, Section 5, including certain blind persons, veterans, surviving spouses and seniors, and to provide that the additional exemption shall be up to seventy-five percent (75%) of the personal exemption, to be effective for exemptions granted for any fiscal year beginning on or after July 1, 2019, or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends approval of this article.

Motion: A motion was made by Assessor Michael Correia and seconded by Mr. Setters that the Town vote to adopt Article 11, as written. Discussion followed by Mr. Correia.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money for the purpose of hiring expert and legal services to assist the Town on issues relating to the valuation and taxation of existing and former electric and gas utilities and generating facilities, or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 for the purposes of this article and that said sum be transferred from Free Cash.

Motion: A motion was made by Assessor Donald Setters and seconded by Marc Dionne that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 for the purpose of this article and that said sum be transferred from Free Cash. Discussion followed by Mr. Setters.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to accept Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44, Section 53F^{3/4}, for the purpose of establishing a separate revenue account to be known as the PEG Access and Cable Related Special Revenue Fund, into which shall be deposited funds received in connection with cable television franchise agreements and other cable-related revenues, which funds shall be appropriated only for cable related purposes consistent with the franchise agreements and in accordance with law, including but not limited to (1) support of public, educational, or governmental ("PEG") access cable television services, (2) monitoring compliance of the cable operator with the cable television license(s); and/or (3) preparing for the renewal of the cable license(s), the fund to begin operation for fiscal year 2020, which begins on July 1, 2019, or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends approval of this article. .

Motion: A motion was made by Selectman Berube and seconded by Selectman Moniz that the Town vote to accept Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44, Section 53F3/4, which establishes a special revenue fund known as the PEG Access and Cable Related Fund, to reserve cable franchise fees and other cable-related revenues for appropriation to support PEG access services and oversight and renewal of the cable franchise agreement, the fund to begin operation for fiscal year 2020, which begins on July 1, 2019, as written. Discussion followed by Mr. Berube.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to transfer any balance remaining in the existing Cable Related Fund into the newly created PEG Access and Cable Related Special Revenue Fund, or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends approval of this article.

Motion: A motion was made by Selectman Berube and seconded by Selectman Moniz that the Town vote to transfer the balance remaining on June 30, 2019, in the existing Cable Related Special Revenue Fund previously established in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44 Section 53F3/4 to the PEG Access and Cable-Related Fund. Discussion followed by Mr. Berube.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer from the PEG Access and Cable-Related Special Revenue Fund a sum of money to be expended during the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2019, under the direction of the Board of Selectmen for necessary and expedient cable-related purposes consistent with the Town's license agreement, and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into agreements of up to ten years or such lesser terms as the Board of Selectmen shall determine to be in the best interest of the Town for the expenditure of such funds for the provision of PEG community access television services, or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends approval of this article.

Motion: A motion was made by Selectman Berube and seconded by Selectman Moniz that the Town vote to appropriate from the PEG Access and Cable-Related Fund the sum of \$410,000.00, said funds to be expended during the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2019, under the direction of the Board of Selectmen for necessary and expedient cable-related purposes consistent with the Town's license agreement and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into agreements of up to ten years or such lesser terms as the Board of Selectmen shall determine to be in the best interest of the Town for the expenditure of such funds as written. Discussion followed by Mr. Berube.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, and/or transfer from available funds a sum of money for the completion of the Archive Records Management project, including any incident or related costs or expenses, to be spent under the direction of the Town Clerk , or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends that the Town to appropriate the sum of \$7,846.00 for the purpose of this article and that said sum be transferred from Free Cash.

Motion: A motion was made by Selectman Berube and seconded by Selectman Moniz that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,846.00 for the purpose of this article and that said sum be transferred from Free Cash.

Vote: Motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to establish the position of Assistant Assessor to be incorporated into Table I (Wage & Salary Group, General Government), of the Consolidated Personnel By-law adopted at the May 19, 1986, Annual Town Meeting, and subsequently amended, and inserting said position under Grade 2 as "C – Assistant Assessor", or take any action relative thereto.

The Advisory & Finance Committee unanimously recommends approval of this article.

Motion: A motion was made by Assessor Marc Dionne and seconded by Selectman Moniz that the Town vote to amend Table I (Wage & Salary Group, General Government) of the Consolidated Personnel By-law by making the change set forth in Article 17. Discussion followed by Mr. Dionne.

Vote: Motion carried by a nearly unanimous vote.
